

# Bracing for the need

More than 600 homeless children were registered for school this year in St. Johns County. 80% of those were part of a family unit.

But where else can they go? St. Francis House has room for only 4 families. You have heard this before but help is on the way. We can hardly believe



it ourselves. We just received approval from the City of St. Augustine on our permits for the new Family Shelter. The **new Family Shelter will accommodate 8 families with children.** One more meeting and the building will be on its way to becoming a reality!

### Through the eyes of a family.

#### Read what one family said about St. Francis Family Shelter

To whom it may concern:

I have been asked to write about my experience at St. Francis House. To be quite clear, this is not the St. Francis Barracks or the St. Francis Inn, but instead, a homeless shelter. I make this distinction because while perhaps the Inn and the Barracks have more of a historical value, the St. Francis House provides an invaluable knot of hope for our community versus another museum tour of the city.

I recently filled out a survey that did nothing to convey the gratitude that I feel towards St. Francis House and their staff. It asked; "Were your needs met?" "Do you feel that you were treated well?"

My friends ask questions about the shelter. They ask; "Are you Ok there? What do they give you? How do they help?" Yes, Yes and Yes.

My needs were more than met. I have been treated better than well. However, before I can tell you what the staff at St. Francis House has "given me", I must first tell you what they have taken away. They have taken away my sense of shame that I was unable to provide a roof over my children's heads. They took away the stress of "where will my baby sleep?" and "How will I cook her meals

and take a shower today?" They took away my fear of the callous treatment of my family. And what did St. Francis House provide for me in return for what they had taken away from me?

We had no money, only the clothes on our backs and a box of food purloined from the last of our meager savings. For the first time in almost a year, we had not been told "no" because we "didn't qualify".

## St. Francis House gave me hope - and a chance.

This open door was just that – a doorway to something bigger. If I needed information, it was at my fingertips for asking; if I needed a bottle of milk for my baby a gallon was thrust into my hand instead. The kitchen door was always open, the office door was open, and we were never made to feel unworthy.

## St. Francis House gave us grace.

Our miracle came through the hands of people who cared about us simply because we existed as human beings.

St. Francis House gave me peace of mind.



There is so much more to being homeless than just needing shelter or food. Desperation haunts you and loneliness surrounds your thoughts and life. You do not "live", and if you do, you are living in anguish and fear. St. Francis House offered my family so much more that I could ever have imagined. I have been treated like family, by not just the staff, but by the brethren homeless that are also residents here. My cup can finally be filled, and I can lay my head down at night knowing that tomorrow if I have a need, they will help me find a solution. I have a door that locks, and a bed to sleep in and soon, with their help, I will not be homeless.

St. Francis House gave me shelter and so much more.

After a few months, BECAUSE OF YOUR SUPPORT, this family was able to secure employment and find a new place to live.

Last year 107 children and their parents received shelter and hope at St. Francis House Family Shelter
